Beware Well-Intentioned Politicians

As a direct result of our highly successful plays, newly elected city councilman, Bret Blackburn has introduced an ordinance to prohibit public nudity. While it is doubtful it could impact theatrical productions, it is a beginning of a process that will probably affect our freedom at some time in the future.

It is important that all Eduners, particularly those living in Topeka, contact the Topeka City Commissioners and express your opposition to this proposed ordinance. You may contact your elected representative by phone or email. When doing so, be courteous. Introduce yourself. You do not need to reveal that you are a member of our Foundation but, to be effective, you must tell them your name and address. You can ask if public nudity has been a problem. Point out that the only people who saw nudity in the plays paid for tickets. Ask why this ordinance would not apply to the strip clubs. Would it apply to Washburn where they have nude models for art classes?

It is important each of us make our voice heard; you can be certain those opposed to our position are making calls.

Nudists Flock To Garden

Britain's first garden for naturists opened recently in the grounds of a former monastery.

Ian Pollard and his wife Barbara, (remember them from last month – the naked gardeners?), threw off their clothes and threw open the five acre gardens at their historic home, Abbey House in Malmesbury, Wiltshire, England.

Following their appearance in TV documentary on people who work nude, a flood of requests to open their garden to naturists were received.

Granting this request, clad only in boots and a leather tool belt, Mr. Pollard said, "People have said it is like the Garden of Eden. We are trying to achieve the innocence and purity of pre-Fall Man."

Pollard, a naturist since his 20s and a father of three, added, "We do not think there should be a requirement to wear clothes. People hide their real identity behind clothes."

Another naturist commented, "Unfortunately the Victorian culture that pervades in this country says nude is rude." What really enthused him was that, "...this is a public place. Naturists are not secret people, but most of the places where we gather are designated spots, but today we are in a public place where we can enjoy ourselves."

By lunchtime some 60 guests, some clothed, others not, had arrived at the garden.

No Rest – Even In Death

He came into this world naked, spent much of his time in it nude, but will – against his specific wishes – depart it fully clothed. Thus ends the sad tale of one, Robert Norton, of Pekin, Illinois. He was often prosecuted during his lifetime for gardening and wandering outside his house nude.

The 82 year old wanted to be buried in his birthday suit, but his family is having none of it. His brothers decided to lay him to rest in grey trousers and a shirt. One brother, a minister said, "He's not going to be buried in the nude."

The other explained that his late brother's behavior was not meant to offend people. "He was a naturist, and he just chose to be in the nude as people who are seeking nature. He was a peace-loving person," he said.

Nonetheless, certain people were offended including his neighbors. One said she never spoke to Norton despite living next door to him for more than a decade. "We didn't really know him. We just had him arrested," she said.

She has spent years taking her daughter to the park rather than letting her play in the garden because of the naked old man next door, she said. "Normally, if we had him arrested in the spring he'd be gone for the summer and we wouldn't have to worry about him until the next spring."

The cycle of arrest and prosecution lasted over four decades, until the World War II veteran was admitted to a nursing home. He fought 20 arrests for indecency since his first in 1962, arguing that he had a constitutional right to public nakedness.

His family said they hoped his burial would lay years of controversy to rest.

The plays were great – all featured a naturist theme and some onstage nudity – a fact which was mentioned prominently in all the publicity about he the plays and by notices posted at the theater. Nobody could "wander in" and claim to be surprised at the sight of naked people onstage.

Very well done plays – all of them. Two were performed in the regular manner with some props and costumes or in the case of a play on nudism, no costume. The third was a reading with only limited "stagecraft," but it came across just fine even in that form.

All were good and all were warmly received – the audience had forms to evaluate each play.

The first took place during a New York blackout with a girl trying to coax and coach a boyfriend who was reluctant to get naked in her presence – even in bed. Is there such a man? It made for a cute twist on the "reluctant partner" theme. I thought it was very well written and played.

Second, was more an expository piece – almost a staged essay of one man's interaction with those around him who didn't easily accept his nudist lifestyle.

The third play portrayed a businessman's birthday gift to himself – coming to work at his plant and working nude for one whole day, to the chagrin of his staff and clients. Cute twist there also in the end, and well done.

These plays were well worth seeing. We laughed, we applauded each one and for different reasons, we saw some of ourselves or maybe those around us in each portrayal.

I'd say the real benefit was for some of our spouses or the general public who don't partake of our nudist lifestyle, but were maybe broad mined enough to attend these plays. There really is some insight – especially in the 2nd and 3rd plays about what makes us, the weirdo nudist they're married to, tick.

The writer, director and actors annunciate it pretty well – what we find attractive and liberating about nudism – and the nudity within each play isn't played for cheap laughs – it's integral to the play and I can't see that anyone would be uncomfortable. You're caught up in the play and the nudity is certainly noticed, I won't pretend otherwise, but it's in context and supports the premise – it's not just there for shock value.

If you want silly jokes about sex and nudity – this is not the place – watch any nighttime sitcom instead. These are good plays worthy of our support and our thanks to the Lake Edun Foundation for breaking new ground in sponsoring the play writing competition and following through by producing the plays in live theater in a very high quality venue – the Topeka Performing Arts Center.

Echoing these sentiments, following the opening night performance, Ernie, our president said, "I thought they were excellent. Far better than I had hoped!" This compliment was seconded by several others.

The plays are well written with superb directing. Characterizations were realistic and the audience found them a great entertainment value. One observer saw an audience member laugh so hard she fell off her chair. That's a real compliment!

And the Media said...

The Capitol-Journal published a piece about the plays the day before the performance, but somehow couldn't find the time to send someone to review them. Probably couldn't afford the Saturday overtime pay.

However, not one to carry a grudge, the Capitol Journal did interview the director, Jon Lothenore about the plays. Included were two "tastefully" done photo's that hopefully didn't further enflame the panic stricken city.

Jon explained that a year ago, at a friend's invitation, he attended the sauna at Lake Edun, described by the Capitol-Journal as a "…rural enclave southwest of Topeka where the clothing-free lifestyle is celebrated." About 10 minutes into the sauna, he and Webb "were talking about theater."

Jon quickly agreed to stage and direct the winners of the foundation's first one-act play competition in which playwrights were asked to deal with aspects of naturism and issues of body acceptance.

The three winning plays are comedies, although one has some dramatic elements to it, said Lothenore, wearing a black T-shirt with white lettering that says, "The Naked Plays," the nickname he and the cast have given the production.

When asked about nudity, Lothenore explained "...no, not all the players are nude all the time. "The only place nudity is used in these scripts is where, if you'll forgive my saying, it fits the costume; where it fits the storyline, where it's intrinsic to development. None of this is gratuitous."

Staging the plays was no easy task according to Lothenore. "It took me four weeks to fully cast these plays, which surprised me in such a healthy theater town as Topeka." He added that he encountered opposition both from within and outside the theater community to the production.

"I'm not sure I can repeat all the admonitions I have personally received," he said, but added that he is proud of the cast, and their commitment, and the work they are doing.

With a running time of just over an hour Lothenore noted, "I know it's a short evening of theater,..but there's plenty to think about, and it's going to be plenty entertaining.

And it is a world premiere, and it's in Topeka, of all places," he added.

Unfortunately, at times strongly held differences can cause some to take extreme positions. In some circumstances this too is warranted. Anti-slavery and pro-civil rights are two examples that come to mind. Such is the gravity of some differences.

Others, (differences)? Well many others, and I would include naturism among them, that fall in the category of, "...life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." This too is broad and vague, but also central to the foundation of the United States and the unique American experience.

There is within these words room for what are essentially matters of opinion, naturism being an example, that does not fundamentally interfere with, place an extraordinary burden on, or bring harm to my neighbor.

What is wrong is the attempt to bypass healthy debate, and by any coercive means, force an opinion on others. The means may be through the back door, using a set of laws intended for one purpose, to serve an ulterior motive. It's clever, it's slick, it goes on all the time, it is wrong, and it is oppressive.

Such a fine game to play on someone else, until you discover the tables are turned and it's being played on you. Remember! The mill of the gods grinds slow, but it grinds fine.

Acceptance Still Lacking

Recent articles demonstrate the importance of our mission.

In Pekin, Illinois, an 82-year-old naturist died recently and expressly requested he be buried naked. However, his family members were so insensitive to his values they ignored them. (See related article in this issue.)

Over a thousand miles away, in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, at an annual rodeo, John Rodgers ran nude through the center of the performance area. "Streaking" the rodeo is also a more or less annual event. This time, though, the three law enforcement officers who chased him, decided to show who was in charge. In an apparent effort to protect the crowd from the offending nudity, the Teton County Sheriff's officer assaulted the nude man with a Taser. This caused the streaker to immediately drop, shaking violently with spasms that caused him to lose control of his bladder, urinating over himself and becoming incoherent. The crowd of several thousand sat stunned, amazed that almost lethal force had been used on something so trivial.

On the other side of the Atlantic, we see a contrast in attitude. Among the huge crowds cheering the Tour de France cyclists, television cameras included several "streakers" running along side the riders at various times during the race. These were evidently treated in the casual manner Europeans typically have toward nudity. These news items illustrate the reality naturists in this country must face: Far too often, authorities, average citizens and even our own family members see us as nutcases or perverts. It means we have allowed others to define us. Naturists around the country have allowed this by trying to keep hidden away; trying to remain below the radar and avoid visibility. This has not served us well.

In spite of good efforts at building tolerance through good behavior, cleaning beaches and promoting body acceptance, every year naturists face a new avalanche of legislation that attempts to identify simple nudity as a crime.

The Lake Edun Foundation attempts to counter this trend in Kansas and Missouri with a thoughtful, well produced newsletter, open houses, our video, group presentations, coffee house talks and our one-act plays. However, we can be much more effective if all of us make a point of defending naturism whenever it comes under attack. If we individually are content to remain in the "closet", we can expect others to lock us there and deny the joys of naturism to everyone.

If, on the other hand, we can find the courage to stand up and be counted, especially when our right of assembly is being threatened, we may eventually find a level of tolerance for naturism in America equivalent to that seen in Europe. It won't happen overnight and it won't happen if we leave it to someone else to do.
